

Extended Cruising Prep

Your Complete Rope Checklist

The no-BS rope checklist for boaters heading beyond the easy weekend run.

A longer cruise exposes weak gear quickly. Before you leave the dock, make sure your boat is carrying the right anchor lines, dock lines, backup rope, chafe protection, and spare rigging to handle real conditions, not just a perfect forecast.

1) Primary Anchoring Gear

- Primary anchor rode sized for boat length, displacement, and exposure
- Proper scope capacity for deeper anchorages
- Spliced termination or thimble eye checked for wear
- Windlass compatibility confirmed if applicable
- Secondary anchor and backup rode aboard

2) Shock Absorption and Load Management

- Snubber or bridle packed and ready
- Chain hook, soft shackle, or connector inspected
- Chafe points identified before departure
- Spare chafe gear packed for bow roller and cleats

3) Docking and Mooring Lines

- Bow, stern, and spring lines aboard
- Dock lines sized for the boat, not guessed at
- Fender lines organized and labeled
- Spare utility line packed for odd tie-ups, dinghy duty, or gear lashing

4) Rope Condition Check

- No glazing, hard spots, or flat sections
- No severe discoloration or UV damage
- No frayed splice throats or unraveling ends
- Bitter ends secured and properly finished
- Old mystery line removed from service

5) Storage and Readiness

- Lines rinsed, dried, and flaked for fast deployment
- Wet rope not trapped in sealed lockers
- Anchor locker checked for tangles
- Dock lines staged by use, not thrown in a pile

6) Departure-Day Final Check

- Weather and marine forecast reviewed
- Anchoring plan and backup anchoring plan discussed
- Crew knows which line is which
- Critical lines accessible without emptying the whole locker
